

Hi everyone,

We are looking forward to sharing another great new year with our current and soon to be new friends and puppies. Although monthly meetings are required as part of your commitment as a puppy raiser for the Guide Dog Foundation, we also plan them to expose your puppy to the types of environments in which they will be working as a future guide dog. Three of the exposures your puppy can never get too much of are, public transportation, traffic and crowds. We will have all three and we will help you guide your puppy through each exposure.

First, we will meet in the parking lot at The Tavern at Bayboro, 120 6th St. S. It is located on the campus of the University of South Florida St. Pete. The restaurant is closed on Saturdays and Chuck has gotten permission from the owners to utilize the parking area for free. Park only in spaces that are designated for Tavern at Bayboro/The Grind not USF parking spots. After announcements and practicing some obedience, we will head

to the Downtown Trolley. Mainly designed for tourists, the trolley takes a loop around downtown St. Petersburg

highlighting such destinations as the Museum of Fine Arts, Renaissance Vinoy Hotel and Dally museum. The cost is \$.50 per person and \$.25 for passengers over 65 or disabled. Exact change is required.

We will exit the Trolley to walk through the Saturday Morning Market. This will be very crowded and your puppies will be exposed to other people's pets, lots of noise and food distractions. After walking around and catching a bite to eat or drink, we will walk back to our vehicles. This is a bit of an ambitious venture so make sure you are wearing good shoes and dressed for the weather.

As always, our meetings are open to the public and we invite any one to join us, no RSVP required. So bring some friends and we hope to see you there.

Training Tip –Pup Ages 10 month to 15months

What Chuck and I like to always tell perspective puppy raisers is, "unlike kids, our puppies come with a manual," and quite an extensive one. The manual gives a great over view of the entire puppy raising process and then breaks it down into smaller sections. It is great to read it in its entirety before raising, but it is most useful as a reference to what to expect during each developmental stage of your puppy's life. All of the puppies currently in our group are between the ages of 10-15 months, so I am going to highlight what the manual says on pages 22-23 about what to expect and what to do during these

From 10 - 12 months of age, the manual says, "this is the time to really start holding our puppies accountable for their actions in a calm but firm way. When asking for a behavior, give your pup time to follow through without forcing the issue physically. If the pup makes the choice not to listen to your request, then a correction must follow. They may look like a fully grown dog, but they are still in their adolescence.

developmental stages.

From 13 -15 months, your puppy is almost ready to go in for training. The exposures you've taken them on become repetitive and it's more of a challenge to find new exposures for your puppy. However, this is also the last fear phase. If you notice your puppy shying away from things previously not an issue, the manual asks you to just ignore it and go about your day. Chances are the fear will pass.

Lastly, the manual reminds us that the most important job of a raiser is to socialize the pup to as many different environments as possible. This along with good obedience training builds the pups confidence and respect for the handler. Lastly, the best piece of advice, balance all work with play and remember they are only puppies so keep your sense of humor!
