
Hi everyone,

Directions From South Pinellas:

Go to Bayside Bridge (49th street North turns into Bayside Bridge north of Roosevelt Blvd.) Go north on Bayside Bridge stay straight it will turn into McMullen Booth road stay on McMullen Booth to Enterprise Road turn right on Enterprise Road take it till it ends at Philippe Parkway turn left or

Training Tip – From Your Dog's Point of View

In almost any training we do with our puppies, it helps to consider your "dog's point of view." Dogs do not think like people and for the most part they "live in the moment." That is why you cannot correct your puppy for having an accident long after it has happened. They do not connect the punishment with the crime. You have to catch them in the act. This "living in the moment" also applies when you leave your puppy at home while you go out. Whether you just went to the mail box or left for a week, they really don't know the difference.

Right now, we currently have 4 dogs about the same age that will soon be called in for training. Because we are human, we are emotional about letting them go. In reality, the dogs see it as a great adventure and don't miss us as much as we miss them. Some dogs

do, however, have trouble adjusting to kennel life since they were used to being the center of the universe at home, but after a couple of days, they get in the rhythm.

Shortly after they arrive they are assigned to a trainer that will take them through the next months of training to become guide dogs. This step takes about 4 months and your dog becomes very bonded with this trainer. The dogs are used to having one special person to bond with so the partnership comes quickly. The last step, your dog will be introduced to their final partner, a blind person. At first, they don't want to give up the connection with their trainer and during training walks, look backwards at them for confirmation and security. Then, something magical happens. The dog realizes that the person he is working with is blind and is depending on the dog for their safety. The trainer is still their friend but the blind person becomes their responsibility. The relationship between a blind person and their guide dog is indescribably unique. And leaving training they become a solid team.

For anyone who has attended a "Celebration Day" when they are introduced to the blind graduate with the dog they have raised will say the same thing, "the dog I raised sure got excited when they saw us but after a while they lie down next to their blind person." As puppy raisers, that is what we call "Pay Day," for all your hard work. So naturally, we are sad to see our puppies leave, but it is far more satisfying to know you have given a wonderful gift to someone who needs your dog more than you do.

I am still waiting for my wonderful gift #3. I have met with a trainer and have been told that they are actively looking for the right dog for me. So, who knows, maybe the dog you've raised will be my next guide dog!
