When one of our pups does not make the grade to become a guide dog, they are considered to be trained as a service

animal for this program. In fact, Chuck and I just dog sat for a 5 year old Black Lab that was originally trained for the guide dog program but has now become a mobility assistance service dog for a Tampa Bay veteran.



The event starts about 2:30pm and goes until sunset, but you are only being asked to stay until our official meeting is over. There will be food at a \$10.00 donation, music and a silent auction.

Directions and Parking:

The Beach House is located on Sunset

Beach, Treasure Island. From I275 heading south bound take the 5th AVE north exit, go straight to Central

Avenue turn right on Central Avenue once you cross a bridge it will become Treasure Island Causeway, take it till it dead ends at Gulf Blvd, turn left on Gulf Blvd. follow Gulf Blvd south for approximately 1 mile to West Gulf Boulevard. The Sunset Vista Beach Pavilion will be on your right. There is a 7-11 Store at the intersection. Make a right at the stop light, turning south on West Gulf Blvd. The Lions Club is immediately on the right. Make sure to park in the lot across the street from the Beach House. The adjacent lot is generally reserved for disabled parking during events.

group. We are very excited to have so many new comers to our group. Welcome and we are looking forward to sharing many new experiences with you while you raise your first puppy.

Training Tip – Let's get started!

What Chuck and I always like to say, "Unlike raising kids, our pups come with a manual! In fact a quite extensive one. There is no way any one could fully comprehend everything in the manual reading it the first time through. It's best to digest it in small bites as you and your puppy grow together.

When your puppy first arrives, they are like a blank slate upon which you will write by teaching them manners, socialization and obedience training. As seen by the puppy's point of view, you are their entire universe and they will take their cues as to how to behave by how you react to their behavior. Dogs are "pack animals" and they need to learn immediately where their position in the pack lies. It is important that the raiser immediately establishes themselves as the pack leader and that all others in the household including, , spouses, children and other pets, are higher ranking than the new puppy. Once this is established, training can begin.

Obedience training is a step by step process and each step builds on the one before it. It requires consistency, repetition and praise. Where we generally start is by teaching the puppy their name and teach them the "come" command. The "come" command is probably the most important one you need not only for control, but for the pups safety. Having your puppy trained to reliably return to you when called can prevent them from being hurt by a car or other impending dangers. Two other commands you can start with are the "no" and "Leave it" commands. These too are primarily for your pups safety. The tone of your voice also teaches them how to respond. A deep growling NO, speaks to them in their own language and will get their attention. Once you have their attention, a light high voiced, "good dog," will also get their attention that they did something to please you.

Puppy raising is a process and you have over a year to complete it. You and your puppy will learn together. Please be sure to read your manual, over and over again and don't ever hesitate to contact us for questions and help. Puppy raising should be fun so let the fun begin.
